FOR CRYING OUT LOUD

In June of 1986, FOR CRYING OUT LOUD, the newsletter for women survivors of child sexual abuse, passed from the founding members to the current collective, who are determined that this very special forum will continue to be published. We are grateful to the Women's Center for bringing us together, and for serving as our meeting place and mailing address. There is no other resource in our community with the Center's strength and commitment to women struggling to empower themselves.

For many survivors of incest and related horrors, FOR CRYING DUT LOUD is the only place where they can feel safe to share their personal histories, their frustrations, and their rage, the sum of which will lead to their ultimate healing.

After years of unnamed pain, enforced silence, private shame, and maddening isolation, together survivors of child sexual abuse can cry out loud!

What started as a powerful form of group therapy and support, inspired by Ellen Bass, is evolving into a genuine social movement, and FOR CRYING OUT LOUD is one of the major voices of that movement.

FINEX HOUSE

We at Finex House have much to rejoice about in this New Year, with the recent opening of the first shelter for disabled battered women in the state! Our new shelter is wheelchair accessible. and has a special light signal system for our deaf guests to respond to door bells, baby cries and fire alarms. Finex House services battered women and their children who are not being serviced by the existing shelter network. We are able to shelter 35 people a day. This is twice as many women and children as we were able to accommodate in our previous rented site. Thanks to the contributions of time, money, beds, and other items donated by people like yourself, our dream has now become a reality, making our new building into a home.

This winter, we are desperately in need of financial contributions, which are tax deductible. We also need volunteers who are willing to commit a few hours of their time to ensure that Finex House can give the best support possible to our guests and to those who are still in violent homes. We bsolutely need help on evenings and ⊶eekends to staff our 24 hour hotline, assist quests in their search for housing, and help tutor quests who want to get their GED or assist children with their homework. CONDUITS

Conduit = Pipeline = Women's Center
Happily, the Women's Center is in a
position to provide technical assistance
to many women's projects. By setting up
a conduit arrangement with small or newly
formed groups, the Center has been able
to help many worthwhile services come
into being. In the next few issues of
this newsletter, we will discuss how
conduits work and describe some groups
the Center is currently helping. Under a
conduit agreement, groups can ask for
financial support for themselves to be
sent to the Women's Center, thus giving
the contributions tax-exempt status.

For example, Boston Women's Community Radio just asked for, and received, a grant of \$2500 from the Boston Women's Fund, which was channeled through the Center. This group of women is producing radio in the Boston area. There are two shows aired on WMBR, 88.1 Cambridge. International Women's Day Radio will be in its 9th year this March; 24 hours of poetry, music, interviews, and commentary celebrating our victories and examining our differences. Sister" is a weekly public-affairs show. Tuesdays, 7-8pm, with interviews, and audience call-ins. There is also a monthly news magazine covering local, national and international issues of concern to women.

HOORAY FOR FINEX HOUSE

The Women's Center would like to congratulate FINEX HOUSE on reaching their long awaited goal of opening a shelter for disabled battered women and their children. 

FUNDING CRISIS

The Boston Area Rape Crisis Center is funded through a Federal Block Grant (the Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant). Due to cuts in Federal funding, the Block Grant will be cut by \$500,000. This could mean a 24% cut in BARCC's funding. We currently receive \$40,000/year from the Block Grant, and our total budget is only \$46,000. The one other Rape Crisis Center on the Block Grant is CPASA, the Community Program Against Sexual Assault (in Roxbury) which serves black and Hispanic women. All other RCC's are funded with state money.

We are asking the legislature to offset this cut by allocating state funds for us. To do this, they would need to increase our line item in the budget (line item 4513-1000) by \$20,000 (to cover the costs of two RCC's). Please show your support by writing your state legislators at The State House, Boston, MA 02133.

GOOD-BYE, GOOD LUCK TO SHARON

Sharon Stonekey, the Center coordinator, is no longer working at the Women's Center. Sharon began working here in October, 1985. She was able to recruit and train enough women to staff the Women's Center so that, for the first time, volunteers are covering the Center virtually all the time, freeing paid staff to do other work. She attended several local and state meetings as the Center representative including Up From Poverty Campaign and Women's Legislative Network. The group eventually evolved into the Politics of Fat group and is made up of 5-8 women of differing sizes, classes and races. We are joyfully and angrily exploring fat oppression and societal pressures to be thin. We believe dieting is self-abuse and we are learning to love and accept ourselves as we are now. POVERTY IN MASS

The feminization of poverty has become an increasing problem in Massachusetts. By 1983, nationally, almost half of all poor families were headed by women: 40% of white families. 43% of Hispanic and 67% of black families. One out of four children overall under age six are growing up poor: three out of five children under six in white female-headed households. one out of two in black female-headed households, and two out of five in Hispanic female-headed households. In inuary, 1986 the Mass. Caucus of Women Tegislators formed its Task Force on Women and Poverty. As a first step in addressing the conditions poor families find themselves living in, they examined public assistance programs.

The analysis of the public assistance programs concluded that as currently administered and regulated, the programs are:

- Inadequate to meet the physical needs of growing children.;
- Hampered by rules and regulations making it more difficult for eligible and needy families to get the help they need;
- Unable to provide sufficient support services to help all those who want to become self-supporting achieve their goals.

As a result of this report, the Economic Equity Act was filed to address on a state level, many of the obstacles rrently existing in the public assistance programs of AFDC, GR, Medicaid and ET. We urge you to contact your state representative and voice your support for THE ECONOMIC EQUITY ACT, HOUSE BILL 4709.

NEW WOMEN'S BAIL PROJECT

A new Women's Bail Project is just getting off the ground in MA. It's goal will be to provide bail for women accused of killing their batterers. The bail that is set for a woman who faces such serious charges is, of course, always very high, so it's difficult if not impossible for a woman to raise that much money on her own. Without the ability to post this high bail, a woman could sit in the Awaiting Trial Unit of MCI-Framingham for a very long time, even more than a year - serving time without having been convicted of a crime. Even more importantly, she is deprived on any real opportunity to prepare for her trial because she has little or no access to the law library and it is extremely difficult for her to have much contact with her lawyer. Finally, a woman in this situation is in great need of just the kind of support that we feel the community could provide and for whome that support could make a crucial difference in the rest of her life.

Within a few months, the project will be looking to recruit volunteers. The job of a bail project volunteer will probably entail interviewing pre-trial women, and setting up community support systems for women for whom the project posts bail. Training and plenty of support will be offered. If you want to talk to someone from the bail project, leave a message for Libby at 354-8807.

Come Out, Come Out, Wherever You Are

On October 11th, 1987, the National March on Washington for Lestian and Gay Rights will bring hundreds of thousands of lesbians, gay men, and their supporters to the Capital. There we will demand basic civil rights for lesbians and gays and an end to the discrimination against people with AIDS. We will make it clear that the rising tide of bigotry against the gay community is an injustice that threatens basic freedoms for all of us. And we will do so with hundreds of thousands of others in what is expected to be the largest gay rights demonstration in our nation's history.

The events of the March weekend are designed to draw attention to the multifaceted discrimination faced by the gay community and by victims of AIDS and ARC. The March and rally on Sunday is the centerpiece; other events, such as lobbying, civil disobedience and even a wedding express the variety of ways in which lesbians and gays are discriminated against and made invisible.

The National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights may be the single most important acct of protest for all of us this year. Whether we're gay or not, we have a vital interest in fighting for the rights of lesbians and gay men to live openly, in demanding an end to the discrimination against those the US Government and its conservative allies insist are not "normal," and in speaking out for massive increases in AIDS funding and research.

At a time when the attachs on lesbian and gay rights are escalating, those of us who are concerned about liberation must make our voices heard.

National organizing for the March is already in full swing, and support has been forthcoming from a broad spectrum of the gay community, including people of color, disabled people, and even conservative or a-political people who have been convinced that it's time to speak out for gay rights. The March is also being strongly supported by a number of multi-issue and feminist organizations. Mobilization for Survival, NOW, the War Resisters League, and the American Friends Service Committee all sit on the National Steering Committee and are providing financial and/or logistical backing for the March. Locally, a number of multiissue and feminist groups have joined in the organizing for the Boston-area. The New England Steering Committee has been meeting for several months.



ON THE MOVE



SEE WHAT I SAY

On Friday night, Nov. 13, the Deaf Women's Community Project and the Coffeehouse joined together to welcome 35 deaf and hearing women to an open house for the deaf women's community at the Center. The event began with a tour of the Center. Many of the women then watched the video "See What I Say" featuring Holly Near, 2 interpreters and 3 deaf women. After the video, women crowded into the living room as Libby gave a talk about the history of the Center. Two women interpreted during Libby's talk. Following the talk, several deaf women asked questions about resources for battered women, services for the blind and personal safety. Patti Wilson then spoke about the DWCP. She explained how the project began as a counseling group designed to address problems of deaf women and how now it is focusing on the community, on their needs and goals, not just as deaf people, but as deaf women. She encouraged deaf women to become active members of the project, to bring their energy and ideas to it. The DWCP meets on the third Sunday of each month, 2-4pm at the Center. Sky encouraged women to also participate in the Coffeehouse and stressed that, with two weeks notice, interpreters can be provided for all events and groups at the Center. Deaf women should call the Center's TTY at 354-8807 to make their requests.


ALL WOMEN WELCOME

TENT CITY

On October 17 and 18, the Women's Center participated in TENT CITY, a protest against MIT's expansion into, and destruction of, Cambridgeport neighborhoods. It was the latest battle in the community's 13 year old fight to require MIT to build a substantial amount of affordable housing, and in other ways keep the area affordable and open to all racial and economic groups.

In the afternoon and evening, there were speeches, entertainment, food, and beverages, including coffee, cider and soda by the Center. Many people, including some women of the Center, pitched tents on one of the many vacant lots that MIT has leveled over the past years for future development, and spent the night. Some tents were left up and about 25 homeless people continued on at the site, demanding that decent housing be available to the homeless.

Sixteen years ago, the Women's Center itself began with a protest against Harvard's disregard for the needs and existence of the neighborhoods that it invaded, when women seized a Harvard-owned building and held it for ten days. We will continue to support efforts against such socially irresponsible expansion. Call 491-2933 to find out what you can do.



LESBIAN RAP

MARCH ON WASHINGTON

Even though the hurrah and hoopla of the Gay and Lesbian March on Washington is now over, it is not forgotten by those who had the opportunity to participate. I was fortunate to be able to travel to Washington and march under the Women's Center Banner. Throughout the day, many women from the various Women's Center affiliated groups participated in the march under the Center banner. As an organization which has historically represented and lobbied for the interests of all women, it was particularly appropriate that the Center be represented at this historic event.

The long weekend began with the migration of hundreds of thousands of gay men and lesbians. As I drove to the Capitol, I was charged with energy as I saw many other lesbians traveling south on the turnpike. This feeling of excitement increased as we descended on the city. Upon arriving that first night, gay men and lesbians were in evidence throughout; everywhere in Washington you could see signs of a great celebration. Affection was free-flowing and friendliness pervasive, even amongst total strangers. It was an incredibly up-lifting, liberating feeling, knowing you could express affection with your friends and lovers and be assured that for that one weekend it was safe to do so. We were all there to celebrate and rejoice in what we believe in; ourselves and our lives.

Highlights of the weekend included the "Wedding" on the steps of the IRS Building, the compellingly powerful Names Project AIDS Quilt, the March itself, the rally following, and Civil Disobedience. At every event and throughout the nation's capitol, there were gay men and lesbians, inundating the city with our energy, pride, strength and solidarity, making our voices heard.

Now, the march is over and we have returned to our regular lives and standard routines. We have returned with warm memories of the weekend and with a new sense of strength, political awareness, and self-affirmation. We are more determined than ever to demand our rights because we believe in ourselves. THIS IS OUR LIFE, AND WE ARE NOT GOING BACK!

POSITIVE THINKING

Women for Sobriety started meeting at the Center in late summer. It is part of a nationwide organization which is the only program in the U.S. by and for women with alcohol problems. The purpose is to help women recover from problem drinking through the discovery of self gained by sharing experience and encouragement with women in similar circumstances. The group focuses on self-esteem and the power of positive thinking to make changes in our lives. Thirteen Statements of Acceptance are read at each meeting, and a specific topic is chosen by the women for discus-A certified group moderator faciliates each meeting. The group meets at the Center on Tuesdays, from 7-8pm. interested women are welcome.

ANTI-APARTHEID BILL

House 1894, the "Selective Purchase" bill, is currently being considered by the Senate Ways and Means Committee. The bill would prevent the state from purchasing goods and services from companies that continue to do business in South Africa. If passed, H. 1894 would be the strongest state level anti-apartheid legislation in this country.

With strong community pressure, the bill easily passed the House in June. We will need an even greater effort to get it through the Senate and to the governor's desk. WRITE your state senator and ask her or him to support this bill. Send a copy of the letter to Sen. Pat McGovern, chair of the Ways & Means Committee and to Sen. William Bulger, Senate President.

HIRING

In the All-Center Meeting (ACM) we recently decided to hire two women for full-time positions - 1) Dutreach/Staff Coordinator, and 2) Fundraiser/Resource Coordinator. The job descriptions were drafted by Judy, our current interim coordinator and finalized by the ACM. We advertised in many local newspapers and were overwhelmed by nearly 35 letters and resumes from interested women.

We began interviewing for the Fundraiser/Resource Coordinator first. The
fundraiser at the Center is a crucial
position, since without donations and
grants, the Center cannot grow and expand
our efforts, let alone meet day-to-day
expenses. All the women interviewed by
the hiring committee (of Judy and Nancy)
were committed, energetic and hardworking. After careful consideration and
a second interview (with more of the women
regularly involved in the ACM) we offered
the position to Alice Roberge. She has
accepted (Hooray!) and will start Dec 7.

We are still in the process of interviewing for the Outreach/Staff Coordinator (the deadline for letters of interest was October 9, so we can't accept any more, sorry). Hopefully we'll soon be able to recommend one or two women for second interviews to the ACM.

The hiring process is always difficult, on both sides. The hiring committee would like to sincerely thank all the women who put so much thought and effort into their letters and resumes.

ACM UPDATE

We want to welcome Incest Resources to their new space in the Center basement office. In the All-Center Meeting, we decided that the Center will outfit the project with a desk, chair and a shelf for literature. This space will serve as a location for doing IR mailings, dealing with correspondence and storing literature.

Judy and Betty have been working on a new, updated brochure about the Center. This has involved a lot of discussion with the various groups that use the Center to come up with clear, concise descriptions of each group. A brief history of the Center and a listing of resources available here are also included.

The Center helps women's groups that, for whatever reason, don't have non-profit status to receive donations under the taxexempt umbrella of the Women's Educational Center. These groups may be very small. very new, or just organizing for a sbortterm project. A formal contract is signed by the group and the Center, regarding responsibilities and financial accountability. At a recent All-Center meeting, Libby gave us an update of all the current conduit groups. They are: Children in Our Lives Conference; International Women's Video Network: For Crying Out Loud; Horizons Distribution (for a work/study student from Harvard University); International Women's Day Radio Program; Women's Karate School: Gay/Lesbian Speakers Bureau; Women's Permanent Housing Project: and the International Women's Video Network.

The usual fundraising limit for each group is \$6,000. The women in the All-Center meeting recently approved a special \$10,000 limit for the International Women's Video Network. They are trying to raise that amount to fund production costs and satellite transmission of the International Women's Day Video Festival.

All donations to conduits should be made out to the Women's Educational Center and earmarked for the specific group.




